The Care Cente was a hive of Covid-19 vaccination activity on Monday, May 17. This was because the Department of Health chose our home to showcase the roll-out of phase two of the vaccination process in Johannesburg, which was a great achievement indeed!

Our Care Centre residents were thus among the first to be vaccinated in this new phase and what a relief to all of us after months of uncertainty regarding the availability of vaccines.

The vaccination process was covered by numerous members of the press and overseen by senior officials from the Department of Health. During the day, we were also visited by the MEC for Education and delegates from the Premier's office, who were monitoring the roll-out. Needless to say, our processes flowed smoothly and compliments were received from all spheres. A small number of high-profile dignitaries, including the chairperson of the President's Solidarity Fund, were also directed to RSCC for their vaccination.

The success of the roll-out is a feather in the caps of Matron Avril Maltman and Sr Leanie Bessinger. They worked tirelessly to ensure that sufficient numbers of our nurses were trained as vaccinators and that our vaccination station was set up in record time at a level exceeding the standard requirements.

If it was not for their foresight, leadership and organisational skills, we could still have been one of the many homes on the waiting list for vaccination. At the same time, I would like to commend all the vaccinating nurses, as well as the support team responsible for screening, registration, directing, and transporting residents - each and every person gave their
