After all this time on the job, however, nursing was still in my heart & so I used the money I had saved and signed up for care worker



training at Lady of the Lamp. After qualifying, I began doing relief work for Rand Aid and in 2019, I became a permanent staff member. I am the single parent of sons: Clive (JHB) & Kevin (UK) and 5 beautiful grandchildren. Jack and I were married for almost 69 years until his recent death in January. He was just a gorgeous man: Extraordinarily kind & always gave his best & expected the best. I miss him terribly.
