We were married for 64 years until his death in 2018. Edel was was my rock. He eventually

Home was always my happy place, but now it is anywhere my family are. I am so grateful to have such a loving, supportive family who always show how much they care.

Passing thoughts:

I have always been creative and loved sewing, knitting, flower arranging, painting, and porcelain doll-making. I used to sew costumes for local plays. I also enjoyed learning how to make porcelain dolls & made some for my grandchildren and for a Rotary Club auction. The nuns at convent school taught me how to paint & I still have a painting I made for my mother when I was 11. After that, I never touched a paintbrush again until some 70 years later when I took art classes at Inyoni! I used to love going on long walks in beautiful places. One of my simple pleasures is to sit in the sun and read a good book.

CEDAR PARK ENA: THEMBI KEKANE

I was born in 1982 in Limpopo, the first born of 3 children. I grew up in the small Ndebele village of Gamadiba. When I was 8, my mom & dad separated & I went to live with my granny. When I was 15, my mom passed away from TB. After matric, I moved to Soweto to live with my dad & then moved again to Thembisa. I did a course at Birnam Business College which qualified me to work in a bank, but I couldn't find a job. I then applied to be a traffic officer, but failed the running test, so then decided to attend nursing college & eventually qualified as an ENA. It was difficult to find a



nursing job, so I ended up working at OR Tambo airport in passenger handling for 4 years. Eventually, I got a job at a retirement village in Randburg. but many of our resi-

dents died from Covid and I was retrenched. In 2022, I joined Rand Aid. I love nursing & being able to help people. It is my calling and my passion. I have been with my partner, Petrus, for 18 years. Petrus is a warrant officer for SAPS Thembisa & has been a police officer for over 20 years. We live with our 2 beautiful children Sharon (16) and Junior (5). Petrus started paying lobola in 2017 & we are planning our traditional wedding for next year.

Fassing thoughts:

My happy place is in nature. This is where I think about my mother; she always demanded that I do things properly, rather than rush to get the job done. On my days off, I love to play R&B and Gospel and sing and dance. A lesson learnt from my aunt is that I should have a vision for my life: Work hard and not depend on anyone else for my future.

CEDAR PARK RESIDENT: CAROL MURPHY

I was born in 1945 in JHB, the middle child of 3 children. My dad died in his 50s of lung disease from inhaling coal mining dust over many years. My mom was a talented seamstress who made all our clothes. We lived in Parkhurst, where everybody knew each other, and children played safely in the streets until late. I first attended a convent school where the nuns were very strict & then went to Parktown Girls High School. I left school early to study at a secretarial college and then did a 4-year hairdresser apprenticeship with Maison Champagne in town. My boss was a



difficult taskmaster so as soon as I qualified, I left to work for another salon. In the meantime, I met my husband-to-be, Willy, at a party. We were married for 17 years & had 2 children: Mark, who died tragically at an early age of leukaemia; and Megan, who lives in a house that I designed in Greenstone. My best job was when I worked in the office and as a sales rep for a housing contractor. I learnt how to read and draw up house plans and how to design houses.

Fassing thoughts:

One of my best childhood memories is of the weekly book mobile that came to our school. I think I read every book that Enid Blyton wrote! I went to gym regularly, sometimes taking over the exercise classes when my teacher asked me to. I used to belong to a Singles Club; every Friday we would dance the night away. I have fond memories of travelling to Switzerland in 1968 to take part in the Gymnastrada as a member of the SA team.
