Mrs Doubtfire rekindles old friendships

A team of residents and staff members from Thornhill Manor spent a happy morning with the residents of Thembalami Care Centre on August 16 – laughing together over the movie Mrs Doubtfire, making new friends and catching up with old friends.

Both Thornhill Manor and Thembalami are run by 121-year-old NPO Rand Aid. Karen Griessel, Thornhill Manor's social worker, says for the past years, the village's staff and residents have committed themselves to raising awareness about dementia before and during September, which is World Alzheimer's Month.

"The Thornhill Manor team understands the impact that dementia can have on individuals and their loved ones. We are committed to raising awareness about the condition, including ways to support brain health, recognise early signs, and offer care and understanding to those affected," says Shaun Victor, Thornhill Manor's manager.

Following last year's fundraising events, Thornhill Manor was able to donate equipment to Thembala-

mi care centre for its newly opened multi-sensory room.

Not all events held in the build-up to Alzheimer's Month are about raising funds or spreading awareness, however. Some, says Karen, are about human connections and how they improve well-being.

"Thembalami and Thornhill residents united in laughter while watching Mrs Doubtfire. Between the laughs and enjoying of snacks, old friendships are rekindled and new ones formed," says Karen.

Dementia expert Debbie Beech will present two talks about the disease during **World Alzheimer's Month** in September. Both talks start at 10am, take place in the hall at Rand Aid's Elphin Lodge and are open to the public.

The first talk, on September 6, will unpack the difference between dementia and normal ageing. The risk factors and the challenges of getting a diagnosis will also be discussed.

The second talk on September 13 will look at how de-

mentia affects senses, mobility, and general functioning. Communication tips and coping skills for family and carers will also be covered. There will be time for questions.

Debbie, who is a trained social worker, was previously the regional manager of Alzheimer's Gauteng. She has worked in the field of dementia since 2017 and is cur-rently the deputy manager of the Elphin Lodge and Ron Smith Care Centre complex.

"Paulina was continuously promoted, first at Bramley to night superintendent, overseeing two frail care wards, and the flats and cottages," says Ayanda Matthews, who heads up Rand Aid's Compliance and Social React Division.

Paulina attributes her work ethic to her strict grandmother and the time she spent finishing her schooling at a convent in England.

She believes that her greatest achievements were to mentor and support careworkers and enrolled nurses at Thembalami. The people she took under her wing went on to pursue nursing careers not only internally, but also at different provincial and private institutions.
